Vision: Gather refugee women from the community and provide them with support and resources. Mission: Our mission is to empower refugee women with tools and resources to enhance and develop their skills through education to successfully integrate, selfsufficient and independent, into American society while still maintaining respective cultural values.

Umoja Abq Accomplishments:

Women's Health:

- 6 Family Health Education classes were offered
- Family Planning
- Monitoring blood pressure and blood sugar
- Family and home hygiene and food storage (3 sessions)
- Domestic Violence recognition and prevention

DRIVE Program:

17 St. Tim's Women stepped forward to develop and implement the DRIVE program. Pr Rachael met with NM MVD officials to address challenges non-English speakers face when obtaining a driver's license. 12 DRIVE classes helped students explore the language and rules of driving Our first student has attained her driver's license!

Computer Practice:

12 Computer Practice sessions introduced novices to computer use and provided free tech support



Support from Volunteers and donors:

- \$6,500 cash donations
- 22 Laptop computers donated
- 1 Desk-top computer donated
- 283 hours of volunteer prep and participation
- 218 hours of student participation in DRIVE and Computer Practice sessions
- 12 hours of professional health-related instruction provided
